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2. Committee

3. Membership

310 people have signed up to the Society. To ensure sustainability of the Society, all signed up members will be encouraged to be fully paid-up members of good standing in the Society.

4. Meetings of the society

12.10.22 - **Special General Meeting:** This meeting formally passed a resolution to establish a professional association and register it as a society under the laws of Kenya. The then proposed constitution of the society was also adopted. Officials who had been serving as founders were confirmed as interim officials. In addition, more members were co-opted into the committee to represent various interests.

22.12. 22 - **December get together**: This was a social get- together where members who were in Nairobi met for an end of year networking evening.

5. Meetings of the Committee

15.8.22: This meeting considered the requirements for registration. A sub-committee was appointed to draft a constitution for consideration by the full committee and members.

o6.09.22: This meeting passed formal resolutions to register a society with the registrar of societies; have interim officials for purposes of registration; committee to cater for registration costs.

18.10.22: During this meeting, committee members were updated on the progress of registration of the society. A big focus of the meeting was discussion of a draft workplan that was approved. The workplan guided the activities of the society for the remainder of the year.

28.02.23: This meeting passed the financial strategy and resolved to open a bank account. Other resolutions passed at this meeting included: to further develop the draft board charter; to further develop the code of ethics for presentation at the AGM; and to develop a privacy policy and notice.

6. Administrative structures

The Committee with input from members developed the following documents:

- **Constitution:** The Constitution sets principles, structure, and functions of the society.
- **Board Charter:** The Charter outlines the roles, responsibilities, and functions of members of the Committee. It will ensure effective governance and ensure the Committee operates in a transparent, accountable, and responsible manner.
- **Privacy Notice:** The privacy notice is in place in compliance with provisions of the Data Protection Act, 2019.
- **Code of Conduct:** The Code of Conduct sets rules, principles, and values that govern the behaviour of members of the Society. It outlines the expected standards of behaviour and provides guidelines for ethical and professional conduct. The purpose of the code of conduct is to ensure that members of the Society act in a responsible, honest, and ethical manner.

Secretariat

The Secretariat will be constituted once the Society has sufficient resources.

7. Finances

The Society is yet to have any funds. The Committee will share Bank account details of the Society for members to remit their membership fees.

8. Society activities

Through the support of members, the Society has carried out various activities including continuous professional development webinars, sector initiatives, and mentorship.

Continuous professional development

- February 16th Registration under the Data Protection Act (Panellists: Peninah Chepkorir, Mugambi Laibuta, and Mutua Mutuku).
- March 22nd Data subject Rights under the Kenya Data Protection Act (Panellists: Phillip Kisaka, Ochieng Ogango, Njoki Kimemia, Carol Gichina, and George Otiga).
- April 20th *Privacy by design and by default* (Panellists: Grace Mutung'u, Amit Gadhia, and Mugambi Laibuta).

Sector initiatives

- **Civil society initiative** 27th February 2023: Amnesty International and Article 19 are organising a session for CSOs to take them through the registration process with the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner. This will be done in collaboration with the Society and members of this group. The aim is to get as many CSOs as possible starting the data protection compliance process.
- **Public sector DPOs initiative** 5th April 2023: DPGSK to collaborate to ODPC and KSG to have a session to sensitive public sector DPOs.
- University students' initiative 24th April 2023: the Society hosted University of Nairobi students for a data protection sensitisation session.

Advocacy and policy engagements

• The Society with input from members submitted a memorandum on digitisation of government to the ICT and Interior Ministries.

9. Collaborations

The Society has had several collaborations:

- Collaboration with Amnesty International on 6th December 2022 for a workshop on taking stock of the year 2022.
- Collaboration with the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner to facilitate a data protection master class during privacy week.
- Collaboration with Adept Kenya Limited in hosting the February CPD.
- Collaboration with CIPIT Strathmore University. CIPIT facilitated the registration of the Society domain and hosting March CPD.
- Collaboration with Tools for Humanity in co-hosting the April CPD.

10. Member volunteers

Members have provided their time, resources, and professional services in the DPGSK CPD sessions and providing mentorship to new and young members. We have 41 members who have volunteered to be facilitators/speakers on diverse topics.

11. Looking ahead

- **Membership:** The Committee will continuously set in motion initiatives to get more members to the Society. We hope that all current members will transit to be full and paid-up members.
- Secretariat: Once the Society has adequate resources, it shall establish a secretariat.
- Sector meetings: for Academia, Private Sector (Legal), Private Sector (Tech), Inhouse DPOs, and Young Professionals will be held before end of 2023.
- **Continuous Professional Development:** The Committee has monthly CPD webinars planned. The committee will coordinate with members who volunteered as well as external partners to deliver talks on emerging issues and technologies for data protection and governance as well as practical application of the law.

- **Collaborations:** The Committee shall work with members to create greater collaborations around data privacy and governance.
- **Social events:** The Committee is working on having at least two social events before the end of 2023.
